

Last week at the 0800 service Canon David challenged me to write about The Order of the Garter this week.

The Order of the Garter is the oldest and most senior Order of Chivalry in Britain, with holders of the order adding KG after their names. Edward III founded the order around the time of his claim to the French throne. The year of its foundation is usually given as 1348. Other dates from 1344 to 1351 have also been proposed but the King's wardrobe account shows Garter habits first issued in the autumn of 1348. It is outranked in precedence only by the

Victoria Cross and the George Cross. Originally, existing knights elected new knights, but now appointment to the Order is at the Sovereign's sole discretion, typically made in recognition of national contribution, service to the Crown, or for distinguished personal service to the Monarch. Membership of the Order is limited to the sovereign, the Prince of Wales and no more than 24 living members, or Companions. Because the earliest records of the order were destroyed by fire, it is difficult for historians to be certain of its original purposes, the significance of its emblem and the origin of the Order's motto, *Honi soit qui mal y pense*.

The Order has five officers: Prelate (who is always the Bishop of Winchester), Chancellor, Registrar (Dean of Windsor), Garter King of Arms and Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod. As St George is the patron saint of the Order, (as well as soldiers), 23rd April is its feast day and if there are vacancies in the Order, appointments are announced on that day.

One theory regarding its origins is that Edward III was very inspired by tales of King Arthur and wished to revive the chivalry of the Knights of the Round Table. The Order was established to mark an incident when Edward was dancing at a court ball in Calais and one of his partner's blue garters dropped to the floor. As bystanders laughed, Edward gallantly picked up the garter and put it on his own leg, telling off his courtiers in French with the phrase that remains the order's motto, "Honi soit qui mal y pense, (Shame to him who thinks this evil). However, the earliest written version of this story dates from the 1460s, and it seems to have been conceived as a retrospective explanation for the adoption of an item of (then) female underclothing as the symbol of a band of knights! At the time of the Order's establishment in the mid-14th century, garters were predominantly an item of male attire.

The identity of the lady concerned is uncertain. The most popular candidate is Joan, "Fair Maid of Kent," the king's cousin, but Katharine Grandison, Countess of Salisbury, has a strong claim, and one Tudor historian named the lady as the queen, Philippa of Hainault.

According to another legend, King Richard, whilst fighting in the Crusades, was inspired by St George to tie garters around the legs of his knights, who subsequently won the battle. King Edward supposedly recalled the event in the 14th century when he founded the Order. A much less glamorous story!

The third theory is that the motto in fact refers to Edward's claim to the French throne, and the Order of the Garter was created to help pursue this claim. The use of the garter as an emblem may have derived from straps used to fasten armour and may have been chosen as it held overtones of a tight-knit 'band' or 'bond' of knightly 'supporters' of Edward's cause.

Whatever the truth, the Order's roll has contained many illustrious names. Nonetheless, members have fallen from honour and forfeited their rank. 36 knights of the Garter have been beheaded, with Henry VIII alone accounting for six! During WWII, the crests and swords of 'extra knights' Emperor Hirohito and King Victor Emmanuel III of Italy , were removed from the Order's chapel at Windsor Castle. The conferment of the honour has even been refused. In 1945, when his party was voted out of office, Winston Churchill refused the honour when it was first offered to him, explaining in private, "I can hardly accept the Order of the Garter from the king after the people have given me the Order of the Boot." Churchill relented, however, and was inducted into the order in 1953.
